Smitherman was the owner and operator of a company called the Central Alabama Police K-9 Training Association, Inc. The company was in the business of providing K-9 dogs to law enforcement agencies.



Shortly after midnight on 4-15-23, Terrence Bailey was driving a 1979 Oldsmobile Cutlass as he traveled east on Pleasant Valley Road in Mobile County. Behind him and traveling in the same direction was a 2014 Volkswagen Passat being driven by Kimberly Patrick.

Bailey came to a stop for a red light at the intersection with McRae Avenue. For reasons not explained in the record Patrick lost consciousness at just that moment. An instant later, she rear-ended Bailey. Both Bailey and Patrick declined treatment at the scene. It was a hard hit though and Bailey's classic car (it had fancy rims to boot and he'd restored it himself) suffered significant rear-end damage.

Three days after the crash Bailey presented to the ER with complaints of pain in his neck and back. He followed up a week later with Dr. Kevin Donahoe, Orthopedic Surgery, Mobile. Ultimately, Bailey was diagnosed with an aggravation of pre-existing disc herniations at L2-3, L4-5, and L5-S1 for which he had treated previously in 2012 and 2013.

Bailey followed a course of conservative treatment and was released to return to work after three months. He then did not treat from October of 2023 until July of 2025. His incurred medical expenses came to \$6,895. Of that amount his insurer,
